



#### <u>n anniversary begets a round for the house</u>

Today (Oct. 13), my son Chris and I went sailing with my old friends Paul and Sue, and my new friend Christie and her children. Afterwards, my daughter, Caitlin, and her boyfriend came to join us at the club. I bought a round for the house with the price of being that of listening to my story:

Today is an anniversary day for me, but given the company present, I'll start back a little earlier.

Twenty-Two years ago, I went to work on a program at Lockheed Martin under the leadership of my friend Paul; I also met Sue, who worked there as well. I learned early on not to try to talk to Sue while she was listening to a Giants game. When I came onboard, the program was supposed to be over in 18 months. Five years later, we were still working on it - that happens sometimes when you're pushing back the frontiers of technology.

So, 5 years into the program, and 17 years ago today, it was a Saturday morning, and I was building sets for my daughter Caitlin's last play – her last performance in High School, she directed after that, when my cell phone rang. It was my doctor. When the head of the Hematology/Oncology department calls your cell phone on a Saturday morning, it is <u>not</u> good news. She said, "Mr. Brady, your test results are in. You have Hairy Cell Leukemia and you're coming in on Wednesday to begin treatment."

As a 47-year-old father of three, I was in shock! When I was growing up, leukemia was a death sentence! In my shock, I had the audacity to respond with, "Wednesday doesn't work for me – I've got this thing with my daughter on Saturday - it's her fall formal, and I have to present my master's thesis, and I have this thing to do for church..."

She responded, "You get seven days, no more." That was her kind way of not telling me that if she gave me much more time it wouldn't matter that we caught this disease when we did, because I might be dead.

I began chemotherapy on October 23<sup>rd</sup> 2007, my mother's birthday and, coincidentally, the 28<sup>th</sup> anniversary of meeting my lovely wife, Denise. She, of course, was much more scared by all this than I was, because if I didn't make it, SHE would be left alone with the three kids and a house she probably couldn't afford on a teacher's salary.

Chemotherapy went well and I was declared in remission on Chris' birthday in December, which he decided was the best birthday present ever.

I returned to work in January and found that my friends there had saved a particularly nasty technical problem that I had uncovered right before I left on medical leave, for me to fix when I came back, because no one wanted to touch it and well, Jim needed something to do, right? What they didn't realize was that I came back with a case of chemo brain that left me with near zero short-term memory -- if I didn't write notes about each and every meeting and conversation, someone could come back 5 minutes later, and I wouldn't remember what they were talking about. I credit that technical challenge with helping me recover from that side effect.

Also that January, I started training with Team in Training for my first Century Ride at Lake Tahoe that June. In the years since I have ridden many century rides and completed the Lavaman triathlon five times while raising money for the Leukemia and Lymphoma Society, who helped develop the drug that saved my life, and other medical charities researching diseases that have affected my family.

In 2010, after we had successfully completed the program that Paul and Sue and I worked on, the week before doing the 204-mile Seattle-to-Portland ride with Team in Training, I went to see my oncologist for a regular checkup. During the visit she said, "so, Jim, since your leukemia is back…" Let me tell you, it isn't any easier to hear it the second time than the first. Since my cancer is a slow-growing disease, I went into watch -and-wait.

In 2013, when 50% of my bone marrow was cancer cells, and I was "no-where near as sick as the first time", I was accepted into a clinical trial at the National Cancer Institute, part of the National Institutes for Health. Now, as of testing last month, I have reached 10 years with no detectable cancer!

In the years since my diagnosis, life has changed. My mother passed away before the first year was up. As many of you know, my lovely wife, Denise, with whom I spent 43 wonderful years, passed away quite suddenly the week before Thanksgiving two years ago.

Seventeen years ago, when I was initially diagnosed, I didn't know if I would live 17 days, 17 weeks, or 17 months. Seventeen years was not even a consideration of mine then. I certainly did not expect that if I lived that long that I would be the single parent!

The month after my wife passed, I started coming to this yacht club to find a community, and what a community I found! A bunch of "pieces of work," as Keith Chastain would say, a motley, rag-tag bunch of people. I haven't met anyone here that I don't like. That's a compliment, not a challenge.

And so, I raise a glass: To family, near and far; to friends old, new, and newest; and to the possibilities that life begets, Sláinte mhaith – to your health.
